#### A Year Unlike Any Other

hen I wrote my column for last year's *Messenger* in January of 2020 very little attention was paid to a new flu-like illness in China. In a little more than a year the world has changed.

Millions have died and all aspects of life have changed. It has been challenging for every individual, every organization and every country. Covid-19 has reminded us that some populations are more at

risk. As an organization built on a foundation of Jewish values helping such populations was and forever will be our raison d'etre.

Our Federation, like so many other organizations, was quick to adapt and regularly use digital platforms for meetings, programs, fundraising and keeping in touch. As the cover of this issue indicates it has been the year of Zoom.

Our first significant program on Zoom was for Yom HaShoah last year and we will once again use

Zoom on April 8th for this year's program. It was a little awkward a year ago, but even the greatest of Luddites have since figured it out. On April 13th, just a few days after Yom HaShoah, I will lead a program hosting two stars of *Fauda*. Our community will be joined by 15 other Federations with participants in all three US time zones as well as Israel. The program will mark the start of our Israel independence week. On April 18th as part of a very busy April schedule, we will again use Zoom to host a former IDF pilot who will speak to us from the cockpit of his airplane

as he tours Israel from above and shares not just the view on the ground but also his family's story and survival from the horrors of the Holocaust. That program is brought to us by our partnership team in Israel that keeps generating more new programs. They have also helped us and our partner communities around New England provide needed support to HaEmek Hospital in Afula and Arab

communities around the Afula-Gilboa region when they needed support during the early days of the pandemic. Most recently they helped us deliver computers to new Israelis who emigrated from Ethiopia.

Everything we do is made possible by your support. This *Messenger* more than anything is a vehicle to celebrate you and your contributions. For many of us the past year has also been financially challenging.

Nevertheless our annual campaign remained strong. Thanks in part to a matching program at the Jewish Federations of North America (JFNA), many of you increased your donations this year. As a result we are able to remain strong and it is critical that we do.

While the challenges of a pandemic dominated our daily lives, displays of antisemitism were everywhere and our work to educate and advocate is as important as ever. The events of January 6th left a painful and per-

manent mark on our democracy, but for American Jews the extra serving of antisemitism made that day even more hurtful and harder to heal from.

The dedicated team of leaders who volunteer their time made this year easier to navigate for our Federation. Our Federation President Manya Bark, members of the executive committee - Marsha Onufrak, Ellen Hull, Marty Lipman, Jack Belkin and Cindy Yoken - also continued to lead by example. Thank you, too, to our Holocaust Education committee.

Our dedicated board members all continue to participate regularly in what are now Zoom board meetings. Their names are all listed next to this column. We would not be the community we are without them. Michelle and I have also adjusted our work to the new demands and the new reality and I am very thankful for her daily contribution. We communicate with you weekly through the *Bulletin* and many of the choices we make each week we make together.

Our annual campaign runs through June and I would like to ask those of you who have not yet made your

contribution to please consider doing so soon. You can make a donation on our website at jewishnewbedford.org or you can respond to the spring appeal. Before we close the campaign in June we will host former New York Times columnist Bari Weiss (you guessed it, on Zoom) in what will certainly be a super conversation about another hot topic, cancel culture.

rector for another year and I look forward to a more normal year ahead. Please join us for our future programs. They are designed for you and from the feedback I've gotten throughout the year, they are both informative and fun.

#### The Year in Review

ince last writing for the *Messenger*, the world has changed beyond my imagination. Who could have imagined that we would be in the middle of a pandemic, with



its lockdowns, social distancing, job losses or uncertainties and more tragically – family loss? Our lives have been upended, but I am reminded that many have survived in more trying circumstances and far more catastrophic events than we are experiencing now. We are truly blessed to live in an age of technology – where despite the social distancing that

is required of us, we can still connect with loved ones, further our education and carry on with business.

The pandemic has also unleashed conspiracies of its origin and purpose (and yet again antisemitism is at the forefront of these theories), exposing our deepest fears as a Jewish community. We have seen in tandem to these antisemitic conspiracy theories our political sphere proliferated with other alarming trends such as Q-Anon and the Proud Boys (and the list goes on). It all culminated in the Capitol a few months ago. Thankfully democracy survived, even if badly shaken.

The pandemic has perhaps made many more of our Jewish community members aware of the hate and antisemitism that lurks online, unchecked. These extremists seemingly have been given the green light by society to not only express themselves openly but also violently. Unfortunately it is not just restricted to the United States. The liberal West across the globe is watching in horror as right-wing extremism and antisemitic ideas are gaining ground. Many experts have watched as Covid-19 deniers have become radicalized not just here but in Europe as well. Many have seen how these protests have helped promote antisemitic beliefs more broadly, raising the possibility of violence. Just last year according to the RIAS (Recherche und Informationsstelle Antisemitismus) Bavaria

report, a Jewish pedestrian was accosted in a Munich park by a man wearing a t-shirt that read "Corona denier" and "anti-vaxxer." The assailant went on to claim that Jews had created the coronavirus.

Those same technologies that have permitted such hate to percolate have also provided opportunities for wonderful programing that reaches further and wider than ever before. Our own Yom HaShoah event was the best "attended" (on Zoom) program that we have had in years. People from outside our community as well as community members that were geographically further away were able to attend. We now have the opportunity to bring speakers to the community that perhaps we never could have.

A case in point is that recently we brought to your

"nearest Zoom screens" a number of amazing chefs from near and far preparing Israeli cuisine. Not only were the recipes given in advance – so that you could cook along with the demonstrations – the chefs also provided colorful chatter about personal lives and life in general. It was nice to "see" a number of the community enjoying the programs. Perhaps when we can all start schmoozing again we can enjoy some of the nosh demonstrated in the programs?

We were also able to bring to the community via Zoom our community's participation in the International Holocaust Remembrance Day. We were able to follow our own small ceremony at the Buttonwood Park Holocaust Memorial with a wonderful speaker from Israel (living in Boston) who recounted her own family's experience during the Shoah. Only on Zoom!

We are diligently working on additional programing to bring to our community, including our annual Yom HaShoah program as well as other excellent speakers. Keep an eye out for those upcoming email notifications. absolutely ridiculous) – but unfortunately Rep. Marjorie Taylor Greene has her followers (how else did she get elected?). Fringe ideas may be looney, but they have the power to create havoc and should be recognized as dangerous, particularly in the era of social media.

So despite the restrictions due to the pandemic our work continues, albeit in a different format. This is something that studying Jewish history has taught me: We are an adaptable people and despite the odds, we survive. This is what our own community has done – we have adapted, and we are surviving!

Moving forward, we must remain vigilant to the antisemitism that has been given a new platform and accrued new adherents. We must sup-

port our Federation as well as local organizations and groups that are working hard to help combat it. We must educate young people, so they don't fall for the online conspiracy theories and propaganda. We may want to laugh at a "Jewish Space Laser" (after all, it's

The silver lining in all of this is that we also have available to us some of those same platforms to get the truth out there to combat such rising hatred. **BARI WEISS** is an opinion writer and editor. She is the author of *How To Fight Anti-Semitism*, published in September 2019.

From 2017 to 2020, Bari was an opinion writer and editor at *The New York Times. Vanity Fair* called her the paper's "star opinion writer." Before joining *The Times*, Bari was an opinion editor and an associate book review editor at *The Wall Street Journal*. Previously, Bari was a senior editor at *Tablet*, the online magazine of Jewish news, politics, and culture, where she edited the site's political and news coverage.

Through her columns and speeches, Bari has changed the way we think about important issues, including #MeToo, freedom of speech, and our common culture. Bari is a regular commentator on television and radio, most especially on HBO's *Real Time with Bill Maher*.

In July 2018, Bari was awarded the Bastiat Journalism Prize for what the judges called "her brilliant, incisive journalism that defends the cornerstone of individual liberty and civil society: freedom of speech."

ike most other people, those of us at the Bristol Community College Holocaust and Genocide Center were taken aback when the pandemic hit. It soon became clear that it was going to upend our plans for spring 2020. We had three speakers scheduled as well as a

conference on genocide on the African continent. As we have been doing for the past five years, all these programs were to be held in person on our Fall River campus. While initially we thought this situation may be temporary with at least some of the spring programming salvageable, after our campus closed we had to find an alternative.


The conference was rescheduled for the fall by Zoom. Speakers addressed the history of anti-Semitism; the Nuremberg Trials and their effects on international law; and the Displaced Persons Camps after spring programming to be held by Zoom as well. These include a discussion of the effect of the Papal encyclical Nostra Aetate on the long and difficult relations between Jews and the Catholic Church with Dr. Arthur Urbana, Providence College (March 22); Latin American responses to the Holocaust with Christina Chavarria, US Holocaust Memorial Museum (April 5); and a discussion of the recently published book *The Unanswered Letter* with the author, journalist Faris Casell (April 21). The book was recently awarded the 2020 National Book Award for works on the Holocaust.

in memory of those Jewish children murdered during the Holocaust continues. A Bristol student has taken charge with the hope of achieving our goal by the end of the year. Once we are back on campus, we plan to construct a monument utilizing the buttons.
